- IQAC interacted with the Departments and heads of departments in order to ensure streamlining of processes and general framework.
- Collection of data and preparation of SSR for 3rd Cycle NAAC visit, 2016.
- Preparations for the visit of UGC team for 3rd Cycle NAAC visit was undertaken by IQAC. Guidelines for the preparation of Department wise PPT slides were given.
- IQAC ensures the timely and proper implementation of the status of 'College with Potential for Excellence'.
- The Faculty, Research Scholars and Postgraduate students were financially supported by IQAC to present papers in seminars and conferences.
- IQAC, in collaboration with CPE, organized one National Colloquium on challenges and promises of higher education in India, inviting eminent speakers from internationally acknowledged institutions.
- IQAC organized orientation talks to the Faculty, Research students, PG students and UG students.
- IQAC conducted soft skill training for the Administrative Staff of the college.
- Annual orientation program was conducted for research scholars in various research departments in research methodology.
- IQAC supports with a seed grant to all departments to organize seminars and conferences every year.



- Feedback and Student evaluation of teachers is collected online periodically every year, data is processed and analysed.
- Overviewed the restructuring of Syllabi of all courses.
- IQAC facilitated the publication of two issues of the Journal of the Department of English.
- A committee was constituted to collect feedback and department-wise report on the 3rd cycle NAAC accreditation held in December, 2016 and the report was discussed in the College Council and recommendations were to be implemented by IQAC.
- IQAC decided to collaborate with Research Council to mobilize research funds for supporting full time Research Scholars.
- It was resolved to enhance Social Action Programme by focussing on community development.
- Orientation for the young and newly joined faculty was conducted in collaboration with Research Council to encourage them to take up research projects from various agencies such as UGC, DST, ICHR, ICCR, ICSSR etc.
- IQAC has played a role of liaison between the college and media to share various events and information on academics and co-curricular activities.
- IQAC ensured regular counseling sessions for students to sort out personal problems and to face life with courage. Every Friday, two hours were spent by 15 mentors to listen and guide the students.

3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

- 1. A project titled 'Sahapaddikkoru Veedu' (A Home for my Classmate) through which all the staff and students of the college contributed a sum of Rs. 4 Lakhs which was utilized to construct a house for the family of one of our students with financial constraints.
- 2. Teachers make visits to homes of selected students as a part of mentoring and relating to the real life situations of their wards.
- 3. Several departments took students to various social welfare institutions (orphanages, home for the aged, jail etc.) to create social awareness.
- 4. Research Orientation Seminar was organized for the Faculty to promote and orient more research in the campus. Students and the faculty are financially supported by the college for research paper presentations.
- 5. Student Journals are published by various departments to create research aptitude among the students.
- 6. In order to conscientize the young generation on the need to protect and preserve the environment, saplings were distributed to the students in connection with World Environment Day under the leadership of the department of Botany.
- 7. An exhibition that demonstrated the experiments of physics and showcasing the possibilities of Science was organized by the College under the leadership of the department of Physics in which 1000 students from schools and the higher secondary schools participated.
- 8. 'SheDrives': The college organized 'SheDrives', a project through which girl-students of the college were given opportunity to learn driving and take driving license with the financial support from the college. A total of 34 of girls availed the opportunity.
- 9. 'Anna Dana': Students regularly bring extra food packets on every Friday to feed the poor hungry at the Railway station, District Government Hospital and Jubilee Mission Medical College and in the streets of the city.
- 10. 'SASAP' (San Thom Academic and Social Assistance Program): The faculty of the college give remedial classes every week to the students of classes VIII, IX and X residing at St. Anne's Orphanage, West Fort, Thrissur. The project covers Mathematics, English, Chemistry, Physics and Biology.
- 11. Students performed awareness street plays in and off the campus on important occasions like Anti-Drug Day, Environment Day, World AIDS Day and International Women's Day. In collaboration with the Department of Police, an awareness programme was conducted for the students on Anti-Drug Day.
- 12. Students organized a 'Bleed-Blood' program by painting on canvas to conscientize on Blood Donation. The Faculty of the College donated blood in connection with the family day celebrations of the College.
- 13. In order to promote awareness on energy preservation, students of the department of Physics designed LED based light systems and sold in the market to utilize the profit for charity.

5. Student Support and Progression

5.1 Contribution of IQAC in enhancing awareness about Student Support Services

IQAC provides awareness regarding various scholarships and other financial assistance, students can avail from various sources in the beginning of the academic year itself. An orientation programme is also conducted with the help of IQAC to the new entrants of UG and PG every year in which a clear cut idea regarding various cells and clubs which aid students in both curricular and extra-curricular aspects. Financial assistance in the form of reimbursement of registration fees is provided by IQAC to students for attending seminars and conferences. Student Journals are published by various departments to create research aptitude among the students with the help of IQAC.

5.2 Efforts made by the institution for tracking the progression

Every class of the college is assigned with a faculty mentor who meets the respective mentees for about an hour every week through which the progress of their wards is ensured. Heads of the department and officials meet regularly to discuss on the progress of students in academics. Personal Counselling is provided to students to face challenges of life. The college council meets once in two months to discuss various matters on the college including student progression in academics. The suggestions and feedback from teachers and heads help the college in taking policy decisions in amending a suitable system to assure and enhance academic performance of the students in each and every semester.

In 2016-2017, approximately 61% of the students, who passed UG, joined for various PG programmes in different specialization in prestigious institutions at national level. Nearly 16% of PG students who have successfully completed courses got placed at various institutions.

An active Alumni Association is functioning in the college, at College level and at each department level which meets annually through which progression of the alumni is updated. Online tools and social networking is employed for effective communication with the alumni of the College.

6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

St. Thomas' College, Thrissur is an autonomous institution of research and higher education which has an excellent record of imparting modern and quality scientific education to various sections of the society. The founding fathers of St. Thomas' College envisaged 'Veritas Vos Liberabit' ('Truth will set you free') as the Vision and 'The diffusion of Knowledge and Truth and the promotion of peace and concord among the various sections of the people' as the Mission. The college aims at forming the young men and women of integrity and quality to be spearheads in all walks of life.

The governance, leadership and management of this institution are enlightened by the democratic idea of participative organization and decentralization in an effort to achieve excellence in the domains of higher education, research and job market. The academic and administrative governance has been given the most prominent place in defining the goals and vision of the college. The management consistently strives to interact with different bodies functioning in the institution and various stakeholders including local community, industry and alumni in order to cater to the needs of the nation and society at large.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System?

Yes, the Management Information System named 'Academic Management System' (AMS) running in the college takes care of various academic and administrative needs of the institution. All prominent functions of the college from admissions, attendance, examinations, teachers' evaluation, students' and teachers' portals, uploading and viewing of results and administrative functions are handled effectively by AMS.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Review and critical assessment of curriculum is systematically carried out and curriculum development is done within the framework of autonomy and parameters of and in line with the affiliating University. Under the close supervision of respective Board of Studies constituting of eminent academicians from leading institutions and representatives from the Industry, the respective syllabi of various departments are assessed, updated and upgraded and submitted to the University for approval. Initiatives are also being taken to bring various syllabi in such a way that the students can clear competitive exams like CBSE-NET, CSIR-NET, JAM, CAT etc.

The Syllabus Restructuring Committee has restructured syllabi which was duly ratified and approved by the Academic Council and will be implemented in the academic year 2017-18.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

The college ensures effective teaching and learning through use of the latest available ICT. The ICT facility has been extended to more classrooms during this year and a total of 65% of classrooms are ICT enabled. The college has well-equipped labs and library. The digital library enables the students with wider learning experience. The new language lab opened in the current year has opened avenues to enhance communication skills.



The teaching faculty use a variety of methods for effective teaching as per the requirement of their subjects. Under the aegis of IQAC, various efforts are made to equip teachers to be tech-savvy. Lecture method along with assignments and seminars are widely used by the faculty in all the departments.

Departments of Zoology, Botany and Chemistry take students for study tours, Department of Social Work organized several field work programmes and other departments conduct industrial visits as part of learning process. Student feedbacks and parent feedbacks are effectively utilized to enhance teaching-learning process.

A Colloquium was organized by IQAC with the support of CPE Cell on 7th and 8th March, 2017 to discuss and debate the Challenges and Opportunities in Higher Education in India. Eminent resource persons from the academia delivered talks and interacted with the participants which consisted of faculty from other institutions as well.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

The college follows the Semester system and there are two Internal Examinations conducted every semester for both UG and PG students. Question papers for End semester examinations are set externally and internally and Controller of Examinations chooses the appropriate ones. Double valuation is followed for both UG and PG papers. In case of discrepancy, third valuation is employed in the case of PG. The answer scripts are barcoded to ensure anonymity of the students and unbiased valuation by the teachers.

Centralized Valuation System is followed in the college. Approximately 5 weeks from the completion of examination in a semester the examination, results are declared. Once the passing boards approve the results, it is uploaded on the college website. After the results are announced, departments conduct evaluation meetings to assess the results. Thereafter, Class PTA meetings are arranged separately to discuss the performance and improvement of students with their parents.

6.3.4 Research and Development

The Research Council of the College formulates policy guidelines and rules and regulations conforming to UGC and university norms for various matters related to research and consultancy. It supervises research work at St. Thomas' College continuously and enables research potentials of the college with adequate infrastructure supports. The College has 9 research departments, 37 research guides and 72 research scholars pursuing Ph. D. The research topics are scrutinised by the committee at the time of synopsis presentation. Two Review Committee meetings are held every year to assess the progress and quality of the research. The Research Council holds an annual Research Scholars' Meet in which the experts are invited for interactive sessions with scholars.

The faculty is encouraged to take up minor projects and major projects. The Faculty and students are provided with financial support by the IQAC to present papers at national/international research conferences.

In the current year, a total of 26 research consultancies have been provided by different research departments of the college associating with 15 different organizations. The IQAC and the college have been working towards building up well equipped research laboratories using various funds.



6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The college has a well-equipped, fully digitised library management system. It has access to INFLIBNET which is a repository of over 6000 academic journals. The digital library of the college, 40 systems are provided equipped with internet and Wi-Fi for the use of the students to browse the E-resources. Our Library subscribes to the UGC N-LIST programme.

In the year of 2016-17, a total of 4042 number of new books/resources were added to the existing library. The process of converting the classrooms into smart classrooms by equipping them with technological infrastructure has been initiated. Currently, 65% of classrooms have been converted as smart classrooms.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The college has a well-defined policy on appointment of staff, training and development. Measures are taken to organize events that could enhance the faculty and the administrative staff in their functioning. The faculty attend orientation programs and refresher programmess regularly. The administrative staffs are given soft skill training in office management.

The college has a well-established Placement cell which caters to the job requirements of the students. It conducts training and soft skills and communication, organizes Campus Placement drives and ensures information dissemination regarding important off-campus interviews.

Various skill oriented programmes and workshops are conducted in the college by various bodies like the Placement Cell, Women Cell, Entrepreneurship Club, ASAP and so on. These are conducted for the students by bringing in experts from various fields.

Orientation programmes for freshers are conducted at the beginning of every academic year. Teachers also begin their academic year with a one-day Orientation Programme. Counselling sessions are held for all the students as per their needs and requirements.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

The college advertises in various newspapers regarding the vacancies in the institution and adheres strictly to the norms of University of Calicut, UGC and Government of Kerala. At the time of interview, experts from the respective fields are brought in to ensure selection of the eligible and best candidate. Preference is always given to candidates who have prior research experience. Vacancies in the self-financing section are also filled with meritorious candidates.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

Experts from Industry who are alumni of the College are invited to the campus and students are given opportunities to interact. Two of the departments have collaborations with the industry for vocational exposure. UGC approved community college is functioning in St. Thomas' College which is also in collaboration with the respective industry. The Board of Studies usually consists of at least one member from the industry to ensure that the industry needs are taken into consideration at the time of updating syllabus.



6.3.9 Admission of Students

The college conducted a fully online admission procedure for both UG and PG sections. The selection criteria are in accordance with the norms of Government of Kerala and University of Calicut. In the year 2016-17, the college received 16376 applications, out of which 803 students were admitted in various UG courses. For PG courses, the College received 2400 applications, out of which 204 students were admitted.

6.9 What efforts are made by the University/ Autonomous College for Examination Reforms?

The college has a well-functioning centralised examination and evaluation system. Feedback from the students and other stake holders are collected and analysed to continuously improve the system. The college collects regular feedback from various officials of the college and Heads and Coordinators of the department on matters for reforms.

The Office of the Controller of Examinations is completely computerised. Examination forms are filled online and the semester examination results are uploaded as per the examination calendar. The statement of marks,



printing of hall tickets, processing of the examination application forms, allocation of register numbers are all done online. Bar Coding is done to ensure transparency and unbiased evaluation.

6.10 What efforts are made by the University to promote autonomy in the affiliated/constituent colleges?

The autonomy review committee from the university provides insights on areas of concern in autonomous colleges. It enables the autonomous colleges to revive its autonomy in a meaningful and relevant manner.

6.11 Activities and support from the Alumni Association

St. Thomas' College celebrates its Centenary in 2019. The college, over the years, has built up an alumni consisting of several eminent personalities. The Old Students' Association is an active body of the college. They conduct regular meetings throughout the year. They have always extended their helping hands towards the infrastructural development of the College. Each department also holds respective alumni association meetings.

Commerce Lecture Series: In 2016-2017, a lecture Series was organized by the alumni of the department of Commerce. The alumni were the resource persons for the event. Jubilee Housing Project was initiated by the commerce department. The alumni supported immensely to construct the house for the family of a poor student.

Physics – An Alumnus of the department of Physics contributed an amount of Rs. 14 Lakhs for the research activities of the department

The alumni of various departments associate with respective departments for placements, industry collaboration etc.

6.12 Activities and support from the Parent – Teacher Association

The college has a very vibrant Parent Teacher Association (PTA). There is a General Body Meeting held every year and the Executive Body meets mandatorily once every month and as and when the need arises. One parent representative from each batch of each course is selected to be a part of the Executive Body.

In 2016-2017, the PTA provided each department with a laptop. PTA awards the cleanest classroom every year. PTA contributed considerably towards the infrastructural development of the college. PTA honoured the faculty who obtained Ph.D and the students who secured Ranks in examinations.

In addition to the General PTA, class PTAs are conducted by each department periodically, especially to discuss the improvement of their wards.

6.13 Development programmes for support staff

The support staff receives orientation programme related to various fields every year. A One day Soft Skill Training was provided to the administrative staff by the IQAC to enhance their skill in office management. The newly recruited support staffs are guided and provided with on-the-job training by the existing senior staff of the college.



6.14 Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly.

Electrical lighting facilities in the college have been upgraded to LED to minimize electricity consumption. The academic block of the college was roofed and the rainwater from the terrace gets harvested successfully into the reservoir. Solar panel has been installed partially on some parts of the roof to collect solar energy. The campus conducted a Green Audit in the year 2016-17.

A two-member expert committee (Dr. Francis Arakkal, Sree Sankaracharya Sanskrit University, Kalady and Dr. E.J. James, Officiating Vice-Chancellor, Karunya University, Coimbatore) made a visit to the College and to each and every department for Academic and Administrative Auditing in order to enhance and improve the academic and administrative processes and outcomes in the College. The management committee led by Dr. Raphael Thattil, Manager visited every department and interacted with administrative bodies for the performance evaluation and enhancement.

7.1.2 Decentralization of Administration

In order to implement efficient and quick decision making, a decentralized administrative mechanism is being executed in the campus. Regular department meetings, the system of having separate Vice Principals for different streams like Arts, Science and Commerce, interaction with Student representatives and Student Union, meetings of HODs Faculty meetings and meetings with administrative staff ensure smooth functioning of the College.

7.1.11 'SheDrives'

The college organized 'SheDrives', a project through which girls students of college were given opportunity to learn driving and take driving license with the financial support from the college. A total of 34 of girls availed the opportunity.



7.1.12 Facilitation for differently abled students

The differently-abled students are accompanied by and provided with support by classmates to meet their needs in academics and co-curricular activities. Infrastructural facilities were provided for the support of the differently-abled students of the college. Special spatial provisions are provided to the differently abled for writing examinations.

Late publication of results, suspicions of result manipulation and not addressing genuine grievances of the students regarding the conduct of exams and publication of results will have a negative impact on the morale of the students and their results.

The practice:



- a. Adequate pre-notice about the date and schedule of tests conducted by the College
- b. Attendance entered regularly, students can view the same.
- c. Previous question papers are available in the College website.
- d. Examination related works are completely automated.
- e. Timely and transparent publication of internal and external evaluation results, attendance
- f. Internal marks are uploaded per semester, students can view the same.
- g. The final results are published and displayed as early as possible to ensure that students have an opportunity to go through them and bring forth complaints if any.
- h. Students are given the opportunity to evaluate teachers. Teachers can view their evaluation and do necessary rectification in their teaching methodology.
- i. Through teacher's portal, teachers can share notes and power point presentations with students.

Evidence of success:

- Students have expressed their satisfaction with the system
- The number of pending complaints from students at the end of an academic semester has gone down to negligible for all tests conducted by the departments.
- Timely publication of results

Problems encountered: All students may not have net connection and access at home

Resources required:

Lack of space becomes a problem when multiple exams are conducted and results need to be published simultaneously.

2. Title of Practice:

Supporting Progression to research

Objectives of practice:

To increase opportunities for students to continue with higher studies and research.

Context:

Increase and diversify courses so that students especially from underprivileged backgrounds may have exposure to research and have the opportunity to opt for the same

The practice:

- Nine departments with research facilities in the college.
- Research rooms with computer and Wi-Fi facilities have been provided for their work.
- A Research Council constituting the research guides has been in place. Financial support is extended to those scholars who are not having stipends.
- Financial support is provided by IQAC to research scholars for publication of papers at conferences.
- Annual Research Scholars Meet-2016 was held on 18th February, 2017. It helped in bringing together the guides and scholars of different departments together, instilling a spirit of camaraderie, interdisciplinary research and introduce newcomers to the system.
- Eminent resource persons are invited to talk about the latest and best practices of research.
- Timely conduct of Research Advisory committee (RACs)



Evidence of success:

- Number of students enrolling for research, especially the post-graduate alumni of our College, has gone up.
- More students are participating in seminars and conferences and presenting their work

Problems encountered:

Need more cutting edge technology and facilities, lack of link ups with R & D institutions; difficulty in balancing teaching and supervising duties of guides

Resources required:

Spatial requirements, Financial Grants and infrastructure like animal house for biology.

7.4. Contribution to environmental awareness / Protection

An active Nature Club is functioning in the College. The College, especially the Departments of Zoology and Botany are committed to an environmentally-friendly and sustainable policy. Environmental consciousness is spread using various schemes.

7.4.1 Seminars and programmes conducted: These departments regularly organize seminars/ workshops/ conferences, etc., to spread awareness and sensitize students and others towards nature and environment (Table 1).

- **7.4.2 Student projects on Environmental Issues** (Botany, Chemistry and Zoology) Students with aptitude and interest are encouraged to do student research projects relevant in biodiversity, environmental issues in local habitats, industry both at undergraduate and post graduate level. This not only gives students a direct experience but also provides authentic and scientific documentation of the same.
- **7.4.3 Field trips/Visits:** The students of undergraduate and post graduate courses of Botany and Zoology are taken for field trips (one day and multiple days up to 5 days) to provide them a direct experience of nature and natural habitats and to develop appreciation of natural resources in them. During such visits they also visit institutions to learn about various biological and environment-friendly techniques.
- **7.4.4 Academic/Research Publications**: The faculty and students are encouraged to publish their work on environment and biodiversity and have published 9 research papers. IQAC provides financial support to faculty and students to present papers.
- **7.4.5 Energy conservation**: The use of bulbs is minimized and the habit of using natural light from open windows is followed in all classrooms except where natural light is not available. LED screens are replacing conventional computer screens. Solar panels with a capacity of 5 KW have been implemented and rain harvesting has been implemented.

Staff Assessment Report – February, 2017

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell makes policies and implements steps to ensure sustenance and enhancement of academic quality in the College. IQAC devised plans and tools to carry out feedback mechanisms to make available feedback from students to the management and people at the helm of academics, and thus to take corrective as well as enhancive measures for quality improvement. Every semester feedback on the staff by the students is collected for faculty evaluation. This helps the staff and the management to constantly improve their methodology of imparting the knowledge to the students. Since the Staff Assessment was carried out online by students through the student's portal of Academic Management System (Linways), the process could be completed faster and analysis could be done effectively. The College Council decided that the hall ticket for semester examinations should be issued to only those students who had done Staff Assessment online.
